Colin Deeley gave us a very interesting and detailed 'history of Southwell Workhouse and the Infirmary.'

Every workhouse had a designated area for use as an infirmary.

Elizabeth 1st introduced the Old Poor Law which forced parishes to provide for their destitute parishioners, by providing coal, food and clothing paid for by parish ratepayers. However, in 1775, a loaf of



bread cost 1 shilling (or £4 in today's money) due to 3 years of bad harvests, resulting in many more paupers needing weekly handouts, and the Rev John Thomas Becher of Southwell suggested his local parishes combined their funds and built a workhouse to house, feed and clothe the destitute in exchange for their labour. The building, which was partly designed by Becher himself, was completed in 1808 to house over 84 people, but then extended in 1824. Although originally called the Thurgarton Hundred Incorporated Workhouse, but it later became known as the Southwell Union Workhouse.

In 1828 Becher wrote a paper entitled 'The Antipauper System', which resulted in the Government bringing in the Poor Law Amendment Act in 1834 and building workhouses around the country.

The workhouse took in men, women, and children, who were looked after by the Master and Matron, assisted by a clerk, chaplain, medical officer and school teacher, all employed by a board of 62 guardians who also made the rules. Bad behaviour did not happen very often, but when it did, the inmates were sent to the refractory, which also happened to house any dead inmates who were awaiting removal by their home parish which was responsible for their burial.

The young and infirm were looked after very well, as they received free health care and education. However, life for the able-bodied adults was purposely hard in order to encourage them to leave and get a job.

Foston WI

On 8th February fourteen of our members met up at Margo & Plum Store & Coffee House, in Bottesford, for a hot drink and cake. Although it was cold outside, we received a warm welcome from inside. It was a first visit, for some of them and nice to catch up, something we don't always get a chance to at our meetings.

We were all delighted to return to our village hall, for our February meeting, after some urgent renovations were carried out. Especially as it meant we could celebrate our 104th WI Birthday, and our members entertained the committee as a thank you for all the work they've carried done throughout the year. The evening began by splitting into four groups to discuss this year's four Resolutions. This is when WI members have a unique opportunity to turn a concern into a national campaign every year, backed by the whole of the WI. A resolution is a call for change on a current issue in society, one is then adopted at the Annual Meeting and the Public Affairs Department turns it into a campaign.

We celebrated that Jenny Bullock has been a Foston WI member for 54 years and then were treated to a selection of cakes and desserts with each committee member being presented with a rose gift. It was a lovely evening with great company.

CARLBY WI ENJOYS A TASTE OF HINDUISM AND WEARING A SARI

Carlby WI enjoyed a taste of Hinduism and wearing a sari when one of our committee members, Yas and two of her friends from the Peterborough Hindu Temple brought the taste and sights of Hinduism to February's meeting and were able to don beautiful saris. Yas wore a shalwar kameez – floaty trousers and top with scarf whilst Rasila and Geeta wore lovely saris. Geeta clarified that they were focussing on Indian Hinduism and told us this was as much a way of life as a religion.

Each home has its own Shrine, and they had set up a similar shrine for us, with flowers, lights, and pictures. Food is offered to the gods each day and bells are rung to wake the gods up both at home and at the Temple. Fresh flower garlands and clean clothes are given to the gods in the Temple each week. 'Om' prayers are said to be the sound of the universe. There are fast days during the lunar cycle for purity and self-discipline and many festivals throughout the year, Diwali celebrates the return of Lord Rama from exile and is probably the most well-known of their festivals.

Audrey was the first to volunteer to be dressed in a sari and each item was shown and described. There are two different styles of wearing a sari and soon the hall was filled with a mixture of glamorous sari wearing ladies, in both styles, gorgeous!

There was so much chat and laughter and many photo opportunities were taken. We all forgot that there was a cold February outside; we were enjoying the proverbial Indian summer. Sadly, we had to hand the saris back, but we held on to a bit of the glamour by keeping on our bindis, the colourful jewels placed just above our eyelines.

Hindus are vegetarian and our friends provided a large and tasty selection of Indian snacks, both savoury and sweet which we all enjoyed whilst we looked at all the information boards which had been brought along. This was the third time Carlby WI has met with the Peterborough Hindu Temple over the years and a firm friendship continues.

- Following on from the successful event to discuss the four proposed resolutions one of our members came back with this information which she asked me to share.

Lincolnshire Community Health Services of the NHS trust provides a Bladder & Bowel Team to provide care and support throughout the county to adults experiencing problems with bladder or bowel control. The service focuses on improving the patient's health. It is based in Lincoln but has clinics in many areas, including Stamford.

You can contact them by telephone or email, and they will contact you in very short order. The contact details are below, and you do not need a referral from a GP to access the service.

They will ask question and then send you some forms and information and ask you to complete a diary and forms and samples (if necessary). You send them back and they contact you either for more information or with an appointment at one of their clinics.

The service at Stamford was excellent; from sitting waiting and feeling very nervous and embarrassed; half an hour later I left with a smile on my face and feeling much more hopeful. Lots of down to earth advice, pelvic floor exercises, dietary advice, use of sanitary items and much else. The member of the team was so warm and friendly I soon lost my nerves and embarrassment. Several appointments to check my progress and see if I had my problems under much better control and cannot thank the service enough for being there.
