



NEWS FROM OUR WIs

Foston WI

On 12th November our Open Meeting included a guest Speaker Tim Coltman, great grandson of William Coltman VC, who gave us a memorable talk on the most decorated other rank of the First World War.

William volunteered to help his country in the WW1 conflict and would go on to become a hero whose great deeds are still honoured in his hometown of Burton. William, just 5ft 4ins tall, joined the Sixth North Staffordshire Regiment. Due to his Christian beliefs he refused to pick up a rifle but volunteered for military training as a stretcher bearer.

His subsequent heroics on the battlefront, saving many injured men, both British and German, and bringing back documentation from the dead for their family's sake, won him many awards. His

actions on October 3rd and 4th, 1918, during operations at Mannequin Hill, in Northern France, earned William the coveted Victoria Cross, Military medal and bar and Distinguished Conduct medal and bar. He is now described as the highest decorated non-commissioned officer of the British Army in WW1.

Since then, Jeff has sung for the Welsh and English National Opera, at
