I am contacting you to inform you that Tina Orange sadly resigned from her position as Federation Chair on 1st September 2025.



DYKE WI



Having had experience in fitting women and girls, from first bra, post-surgery, to later life she makes sure her team, based in Sutton on Trent, have these skills and are happy to assist everyone in finding the best fit, no matter what issues they have. They visit local organisations, charities, and schools to talk about the importance of good breast health. They send thousands of used bras out to Gambia.

In January, Janice launched a petition asking the Government to consider a voucher scheme for bras and prosthetics for breast cancer survivors, just as there is for wigs. Believing that women

deserve choice and dignity in their recovery. They didn't reach the signature numbers for it to be considered, even with a great deal of local help. But that doesn't mean this was a failure.

We also had a suffragette who seemed to have a tail! It was a delightful day and celebrates what the WI is all about: friends, fun, laughter, and memories





These are set in Victorian England and feature an ancestor of Lady Beatrice, who solves murders over cups of tea, from whispered gossip, and overheard conversations in drawing rooms.

E-books are her biggest sellers, but she has got her first 3 books in audio and her books are also available in large print. LANGTOFT WI

Langtoft WI were recently treated to a pocket history of a much-admired local landmark –Molecey Mill - by the current owner, Graham Magee. With its preserved water mill, 16 bedrooms and 20-acre garden, it has often been described as a "magical place", but as with many old buildings, its story is as much about the people who have lived there as the mill itself.

The first owner was Godfrey de Cambrai, a literary man, with the land being managed by Margaret Beaufort. When the Molecey's arrived, the estate grew to over 1,000 acres and many improvements were made, including a new water wheel in 1860. Having made bad investment choices, John Molecey had to sell the house and contents to pay his debts and by 1950, the house was derelict and marked for demolition. At this point, local printers, the Riley's bought the mill for £4,000 and fell in love with it. Two girls, Sally, now 93 years old, and Bridget Riley grew up there. Sally remembers exploring all day long and Bridget, an artistic genius, was inspired by the water surrounding the mill in her artwork. Sadly, their father was seriously injured in a traffic accident and could no longer maintain the property.

So, in 1958, it was sold to the Van Geests. As well as building their banana business and raising money for local hospitals, they wrote a lot of articles about the house and opened it to the public. In 2015, the mill was bought by Graham, and in 2019 he also bought the Granary.



Since then, the gardens have hosted The Chelsea Flower Show in lockdown; the mill hosts 12 weddings per year along with many other smaller family events and has featured in the Times newspaper as one of the top 10 venues to visit.

Having whetted our appetite with his potted history, we just had to take Graham Magee up on his offer to visit the Mill and grounds to see for ourselves the 'magical place' he described. We were not disappointed. This property is obviously so well-loved, respected and cared for; and it returns that love with an incredibly warm and welcoming atmosphere t that you can feel as soon as you step in. We were treated to tea and cake and then invite to

wander round the gardens at our leisure. I can report that Graham is right – Molecey Mill is indeed a magical place!

SOUTH KYME WI

For our August Day Trip this year we decided to pay a visit to the Romany Museum in Spalding. Six members and two guests met Margaret Boswell and some of her family members.

Margaret gave us an interesting tour of the museum, which had lots of the most beautiful vans. She explained to us about how different artists painted the designs on the vans. Each artist would incorporate a certain shape or flower etc into the design.

We then watched a couple of videos which showed life on the open road with shire horses pulling the vans along country roads. Unfortunately, this rarely happens nowadays because of the volume of traffic on the roads.

After our visit was over, we went to a lovely pub called "The Moorings". We were a little bit later than what we anticipated getting there. However, the staff couldn't have been more welcoming. One of the chef's even stayed on for us in order that we could still eat. The food was excellent, and we enjoyed sitting outside with lovely views of the river.
