## RESOLUTION RESULTS 2023

The results of the voting for this year's resolution have now been counted. More than 93,000 votes were cast and the winner with 36,736 votes, were in favour of:

### ***Clean rivers for people and wildlife***

*Water quality in our rivers is shameful. Legally, designated bathing waters must be regularly monitored for pollution. The NFWI urges its members, the wider public, local authorities and Government to make, support and promote applications for official designated bathing sites on appropriate stretches of rivers in their area. This will be as instrumental to the clean-up of rivers as it has been for water quality improvement at coastal beaches.*



WIs should now consider how they wish their delegate to vote on the resolution at the NFWI Annual Meeting in Cardiff on 25th May, 2023. All WIs get one vote on the resolution – for or against.

WIs may choose to give their link delegate discretion to decide how to vote after hearing the speakers and the debate at the Annual Meeting.

WIs are encouraged to hold discussion events to allow members to consider how they wish their delegate to vote.

### **NFWI Resolution Discussion Event**

## “I'm sorry, I can't come now.....”

There have been some queries about the Federation Cancellation Policy. The following, we hope, will clarify the situation.

- When we plan an event or activity, a detailed costing exercise is undertaken. This enables us to calculate the ticket price at best value for our members, and also helps us establish the “break even” point, i.e., the minimum number of tickets we need to sell to make the event viable.
- For every event, we provide a flyer and an application form. The flyer will always state the Closing Date for the event.
- WIs submit application forms but no money is taken at the point of application.

Nonetheless, the act of adding your name to the list indicates a commitment to purchase the ticket. This provides a significant degree of flexibility to you, our members, something that is not offered by, for example, theatres, who expect money up front on booking and offer no refunds if you then cannot use the ticket.

- If you find you cannot attend, for whatever reason, you can cancel with no penalty right up to the working day before the Closing Date.
- On the Closing Date, the Federation Secretary reviews the applications, and a decision is taken as to whether the event is viable, i.e., at least the minimum number of tickets has been sold.
- If the event is viable, an email is sent out to all applicants, confirming their place and requesting payment is made. Cheques will then be cashed, or BACs payments expected.
- If you cancel on or after the Closing Date, we will always suggest that you endeavour to resell your ticket, in which case there is no penalty. Clearly, this has to be your responsibility, although if there is a waiting list for the event, we may be able to assist. However, if you are unable to do this, then we have no option but to request payment in full. This is because we have made a commitment to our “suppliers” - those providing us with the wherewithal to put on the event or activity – and they expect us to pay them. It may also be the difference between an event being viable or not.

Hopefully, this explains why, if you cancel after a Closing Date, and are unable to resell your ticket, we ask for payment. We will always do our best to mitigate if it is at all possible, but you will appreciate that as a Federation, we cannot take on the liability for such costs.

Everyone was treated to an Afternoon Tea provided by members of the Board of Trustees. # ANNUAL MEETING 2023

The 45th Annual Meeting held at the Olde Barn Hotel in Marston was well attended by over 125 members. The doors opened at 10am and soon everyone was seated having got a drink and raffle tickets ready for the event to start. Tina Orange began the ceremony with a welcome to everyone before the traditional singing of Jerusalem. Then it was the serious business of the day – Introduction to the Board of Trustees, the minutes from 2022 Annual Meeting, the Chair's report, Treasurer's report, and Looking Forward for the Federation. The business part of the meeting finished with the Take a Chance draw.



A warm welcome was given for the morning speaker – Frances Carlaw, otherwise known as 'The Pearl Lady' which reflected her passion for the world's most exotic of gemstones. Frances gave an interesting talk on the history and science of the most secretive and living gemstone - the pearl. She talked about the origins and myths surrounding them as well as the different shapes and colours. Frances showed us examples of how she has combined the pearl with past time items such as beads and stones, buckles and bows to create or re-vitalise art deco style jewellery and artefacts showing how the old and the new combine to save resources. Frances had an innovative way of displaying her pearls by attaching the necklaces to seat cushions to pass around the audience. During the lunch break pearl necklaces, bracelets and earrings were available to purchase.



Next on the agenda was the presentation of trophies and certificates. Nine WIs were celebrating anniversaries during 2023 including Pinchbeck WI for 100 years with Colsterworth WI and Long Bennington both reaching 105 years.

The Yorkshire Forager, Alysia Vasey, was the afternoon speaker. Having braved the snowy conditions to travel from Halifax, Alysia said her story was a tale of two halves. Alysia stated that her success as a wild food forager started from learning from her grandfather. He was living in a wood in Poland having escaped from being taken as a Prisoner of War during the Nazi regime. The Grandfather, along with his brother, survived for one year on food he could find by foraging. Eventually he came to Britain finding love, family, and safety.



Alysia started her career in the Navy but due to an accident decided to leave and turn her hobby into a career using the knowledge passed on through her family.

An expert in the use of botanicals, Alysia gained a reputation amongst culinary professionals as a distinguished consultant and supplier on all things wild. She works advising several famous chefs on television and is regularly featured in magazines. Her work includes publishing a book and producing a gin. Alysia was a bubbly enthusiastic speaker who clearly enjoys her success.

The Annual meeting drew to a close with the Denman Dip and the raffle. Sixteen prizes were donated including a James Martin Gin, three pairs of pearl earrings and vouchers for the spa from the Hotel. Angela Turner, president of Caythorpe and District WI thanked the Board of Trustees. Liz McIntosh stepped down as Chair, Janis Tunaley said a few words on behalf of the Federation and presented Liz with a gardening voucher and a bouquet of flowers. The day finished with us all singing the National Anthem.

# CLIMATE AMBASSADORS

## Green Gardening

As gardeners are we doing enough to be 'Green'? There isn't a straightforward answer to that question as a lot of factors have to be taken into consideration. These include rainfall and soil condition, even where you are in the country i.e., on the south coast or in the north of the country.

### Let's start at the beginning

**SOIL** - Our soil is the most important component in our garden. What soil you have will dictate the type of plants that will thrive in your garden. This is known as 'Right plant right place'.

**SOIL CONDITION** -The condition of soil is also paramount. Adding organic matter such as leaf mould, horse manure or homemade compost can add nutrients, open up the structure of your soil and also help retain moisture.

- Horse manure must be at least 18 months old before adding to the soil - because it has a high nitrogen content and may burn the roots of your plants if added too early.
- Leaf mould can be made at home by collecting leaves and putting in an open compost for 12 months. If you have a small garden, this can be achieved by putting the leaves in an old compost bag/bin liner, holes punched in the bag, tied off and left behind the shed or garage for 12 months. You will have amazing leaf mould at the end of this process.
- As peat is being removed from sale for gardeners, why not make your own garden compost? Just add brown waste, e.g., chopped up prunings, green waste, such as grass cuttings and weeds (before going to seed), uncooked vegetable waste and items such as cardboard egg boxes, scrunched up newspaper - about 1/3 of each. This will allow the breakdown of the material, the heat to accumulate and the microorganisms to do their work. If you get the quantities right, you will have beautiful, rich, dark compost.

**PLASTIC POTS** – whilst plastic does not have the best reputation, it doesn't need to be our enemy. Plastic pots can be used many times. Just remember that at the end of the season the pots need to be washed and stored in a cool place, out of direct sunlight. Of course, you could make your own seed/seedling containers from newspaper, toilet roll holders or kitchen roll holders. Anything grown in these can be planted directly into the soil and the pot will biodegrade into the soil. Not only have you not disturbed the root system you have also added organic matter to the soil.

**PLASTIC BOTTLES** - can also be used in the garden as small propagators for cuttings and seedlings thus using plastic more than once and not having to buy potentially expensive propagators.

**SEEDS** - Save your own seeds! This is not as difficult as people seem to think. As the seed heads develop on the plant, snip off and place upside down in a paper bag. Hang up in a cool dry place and allow the seeds to fall from the seed pods. Remember to write on the bag which plant the seeds are from. Once the pods are empty, dispose of the pods on your compost heap.

I hope this gives you some ideas for green gardening in 2023.
